Overview of the Safety Instrumented System (SIS) Management Module

The SIS Management module lets you manage the logic solvers and instrumented functions that are in place in a facility to monitor and maintain controlled processes and ensure the efficiency and safety of those processes.

Using SIS Management, you can conduct a Safety Integrity Level (SIL) analysis, which you can use to assess the integrity of the safety instrumented systems and to uncover areas that may require further safeguarding. An SIL analysis (pronounced S-I-L) lets you assign a numeric rating to the instrumented functions that you are analyzing. This numeric rating represents the level of protection that those systems provide.

To conduct an SIL analysis in SIS Management, a team will:

- Define the function of the safety instrumented systems that will be assessed.
- Identify the undesirable consequences that the safety instrumented systems are designed to prevent.
- Test the components of the safety instrumented systems to determine if its performance is meeting the specified requirements and identify failures that may be occurring within those systems.
- Based on the test results, determine where further improvements are needed within the safety instrumented systems.

In addition, the SIS Management module provides the tools necessary for compliance with the standard specified in International Electrotechnical Commission (IEC) 61511.

Safety Instrumented System

Consider a heating element that heats the temperature of a room to reach and maintain the desired temperature (e.g., 20 degrees Celsius). If the temperature increases too rapidly, the temperature change could lead to a chain of events that may result in equipment failure or a catastrophic event. To prevent a rapid temperature increase during the heating process, a sensor within the thermometer continually measures the temperature, and relays that information to a computer. The computer decides whether the temperature is increasing at intervals that are in line with the specified safe limits for this process. If the data transmitted to the computer indicates that the temperature is increasing too rapidly, it will send a command to the heating element to decrease the temperature.

Together, the sensor within the thermometer, the computer, and the heating element act as a safety instrumented system that monitors the process of heating a room to ensure that it is performed safely and efficiently.

About the Components in a Safety Instrumented System (SIS)

A safety instrumented system (SIS) comprises of instruments that are designed specifically to:

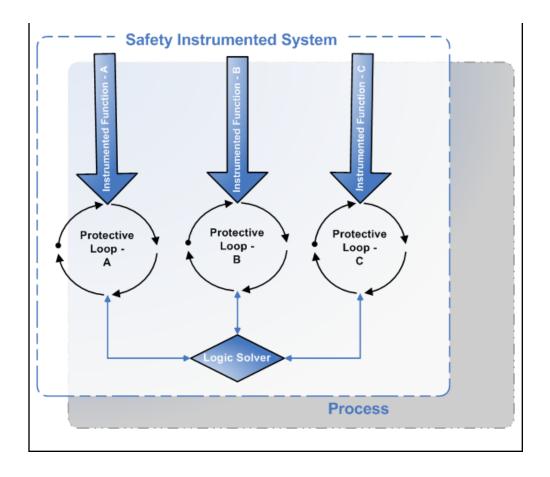
- Monitor the conditions of a process
- · Recognize conditions that are indicative of failure
- · Prevent consequences

A given process can have more than one SIS in place to monitor and safeguard its conditions.

- Each SIS contains one or more protective instrument loops per instrumented function. The
 protective instrument loop is a series of interconnected instruments. Each loop is designed
 to maintain a defined condition within the process, meaning that it serves a specific
 purpose or a function. In other words, for every instrumented function that exists for a
 safety instrumented system, there is one protective instrument loop in place to fulfill that
 function.
- Each SIS contains one logic solver to interpret the readings from the components of the
 protective instrument loop and instruct those elements to take action if necessary. The
 logic solver measures that information against predefined criteria to determine whether
 that system needs to make adjustments to mitigate the risk associated with the
 instrumented functions of each protective instrument loop.

Functions of Individual Components in an SIS

Assume that Unit A provides steam to Unit B, and SIS-A is in place on Unit A and Unit B to maintain the pressure levels during that process to prevent loss of pressure or excess pressure beyond the defined safe and productive levels. Maintaining safe and productive pressure levels are the instrumented functions of the protective instrument loops within SIS-A. The logic solver within SIS-A receives data from the components of the protective instrument loops and decides whether the pressure levels are normal, or if they exceed or are lower than the safe and productive pressure levels. If the current pressure levels indicate the possibility of a process failure, which includes scenarios like loss of productivity or explosion, the logic solver sends signal to the components of the SIS to do something to mitigate the current condition. For example, if the current condition of the process indicates that the pressure is too low, the logic solver will tell an element of the protective instrument loop to increase the pressure so the levels are within the safe and productive levels defined for that process.

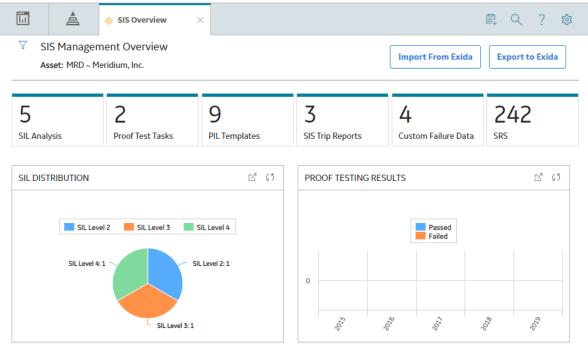

The following information related to all hierarchy levels appears on the page:

- The **SIL Analysis** tab: Displays a list of SIL Analyses. You can create a new analysis, or access an existing one. The number on the tab indicates the number of SIL Analyses.
- The **Proof Test Tasks** tab: Displays a list of Proof Test Tasks that are linked to an Instrumented Function or a Logic Solver. The Proof Test Tasks that are created in Asset Strategy Management also appear in the list. The number on the tab indicates the number of Proof Test Tasks.
- The **PIL Templates** tab: Displays a list of Protective Instrument Loop Templates. You can create a new template, or access or delete an existing one. The number on the tab indicates the number of Protective Instrument Loop Templates.
- The **SIS Trip Reports** tab: Displays a list of SIS Trip Reports. You can create a new one, or access or delete an existing one. The number on the tab indicates that number of SIS Trip Reports.
- The **Custom Failure Data** tab: Displays a list of Failure Rate Reference Data records for Sensors, Logic Solvers, and Final Elements. You can create a new one, or access or delete an existing one. The number on the tab indicates the number of Custom Devices.
- The **SRS** (**SRS**) tab: Displays a list of SRS Projects. You can create a new SRS Template. The number on the tab indicates that number of SRS Projects.

The page displays the following graphs that correspond to all hierarchy levels:

Procedure

1. In the top navigation bar, select \triangleq .

The **Asset Hierarchy** page appears.

2. In the left pane, navigate to the hierarchy level for which you want to access the **SIS Management Overview** page.

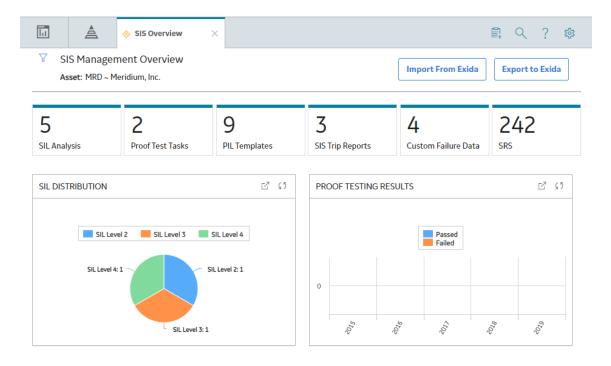
A list of types of analyses performed on the selected hierarchy level appears in the workspace, in the **Health** section.

3. In the workspace, select the **Integrity** tab.

The **Integrity** section appears.

4. In the section, in the **SIS Management** row, select the link.

The following information appears on the page:

- The SIL Analysis tab: Displays a list of SIL Analyses only for the selected asset and all

- Proof Testing Results: Plots the number of passed and failed proof tests for the past four years. These are the Proof Tests that are related to the selected hierarchy level.

By default, the hierarchy level is set to Home and the information that appears on the **SIS Management Overview** page is related to all Hierarchy Levels, including records that are not associated with any Asset. You can filter the information that appears on the page based on a specific Asset by selecting in the upper-left corner of the page.

SIS Management Workflow

This workflow provides the basic, high-level steps for using this module. The steps and links in this workflow do not necessarily reference every possible procedure.

Conducting an SIL analysis includes completing the following steps:

- 1. Create an SIL Analysis, to store the details of the SIL analysis that you want to perform, including the start and end dates for the analysis.
- 2. Define the SIL analysis team, who will conduct the analysis.
- 3. Define the logic solvers that will monitor the process associated with the instrumented functions and protective instrument loops within the SIL analysis.
- 4. Define the instrumented functions that will be used to maintain safety integrity level within tolerable limits.
- 5. Perform SIL Assessment to determine the target SIL value for each instrumented function in the analysis.
- 6. Perform SIL Verification by creating a Protective Instrument Loop and defining its elements. APM then performs the SIL calculations for the loop, and allows you to verify if the target SIL is achieved.
- 7. Perform SII Validation to ensure that the system is functioning to the standards for which it is designed.
- 8. Link the SIL Analysis to reference documents , which contain reference material relevant to the analysis.
- 9. Propose a Recommendation. Recommendations can be used strategically to propose an action that will mitigate a risk that has been assessed, or tactically to alert another user or create a work request to resolve an issue.

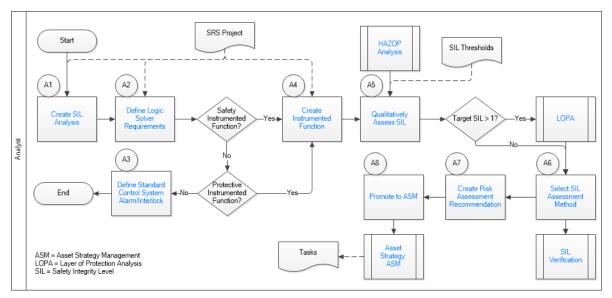
SIL Assessment

Create SIL Analysis

Persona: Analyst

Create an SIL Analysis record to store the details of the SIL Analysis that you want to conduct.

Define Logic Solver Requirements

Persona: Analyst

Identify the logic solver that you want to use in the SIL Analysis. Create a Logic Solver to store the details of the logic solver.

Safety Instrumented Function?

Persona: Analyst

Determine if the instrumented function is critical to operational, health, and environmental aspects of safety, and assemble all the background information. You must assess the Safety Integrity level (SIL) and the logic solver requirements that you need to maintain for the instrumented function to keep the process safe.

Protective Instrumented Function?

Persona: Analyst

Determine if the instrumented function is not critical to safety, but is required to minimize the economic impact in the event of a failure.

Define Standard Control System Alarm/Interlock

Persona: Analyst

If the instrumented function is not critical to safety or is not protective, then you must install a standard control system interlock to warn an operator in case of a failure. However, you need not perform SIL assessment for the control system.

Create Instrumented Function

Persona: Analyst

Create an Instrumented Function to record the details of the instrumented function such as the initiating event, safe state, and response time.

HAZOP Analysis

Persona: Analyst

Go to the HAZOP Analysis workflow.

SIL Thresholds

Persona: Analyst

If you will perform SIL assessment using a Risk Matrix, you must refer to the SIL threshold values defined in a SIL Threshold record. The risk rank that you specify in the Risk Matrix will be compared with these SIL threshold values to calculate the target SIL value.

Asset Strategy Management

Persona: Analyst

Go to the Asset Strategy Management workflow.

Qualitatively Assess SIL

Persona: Analyst

If you will perform SIL assessment using a Hazards Analysis, and then link the Hazards Analysis to the Instrumented Function. If you will perform SIL assessment using a Risk Matrix, specify the risk rank for the various aspects of the Risk Matrix (e.g., Safety, Operational, Environment). You can also perform an external SIL assessment.

Select SIL Assessment Method

Persona: Analyst

After performing various types of SIL assessment (i.e., LOPA, Risk Matrix, PHA, External), you must associate one of them with the Instrumented Function. The SIL calculations related to the selected record will be associated with the Instrumented Function. These calculations are used to compare the achieved SIL values (from SIL Verification).

Create Risk Assessment Recommendation

Persona: Analyst

Create a Risk Assessment Recommendation to provide suggestions on how to achieve the target SIL.

Promote to ASM

Persona: Analyst

Promote the Recommendation to Asset Strategy Management (ASM), where the associated action can be implemented as an Inspection Task of the task type Proof Test.

LOPA

Go to the LOPA workflow.

SIL Verification

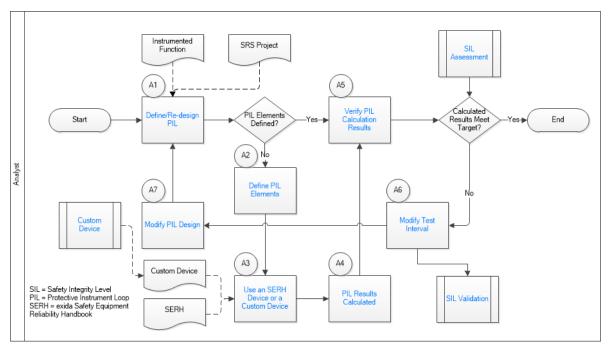

Define/Re-design PIL

Persona: Analyst

Determine if there is a Protective Instrument Loop (PIL) for the Instrumented Function. If one exists, redesign the loop based on the requirement. If one does not exist, define the PIL.

PIL Elements Defined?

Persona: Analyst

Determine if there are sensors, logic solvers, and final elements in the PIL.

Define PIL Elements

Persona: Analyst

After you identify the elements of the PIL, enter the details of each element in the corresponding record that is created when you create a PIL, such as the type, manufacturer, model number, and the failure rate.

Use an SERH Device or a Custom Device

Persona: Analyst

You can link a custom device or an element from SERH. This will populate the interfaces, modules, and channels for the element as needed. Alternatively, you can use the failure rate data provided by the manufacturer of the device, failure distributions, or other failure rate databases.

PIL Results Calculated

Persona: Analyst

After you select an element from SERH, the details of the element such as the mean time to repair and mission time are populated. Based on these values, the probability of failure, spurious trip limit, and other values are calculated. APM then calculates the SIL value, spurious trip limit, and other values for the entire loop using the Markov calculation engine.

Verify PIL Calculation Results

Persona: Analyst

Verify if the loop calculations meet the target SIL requirement specified in SIL Assessment.

Modify Test Interval

Persona: Analyst

You can modify the proof test intervals of each element to ensure that the SIL value meets the target SIL value. You can manage proof testing in SIL Validation.

SIL Validation

Go to the SIL Validation workflow.

Modify PIL Design

Persona: Analyst

Elements with better failure rates can be substituted or additional elements can be added in voted scenarios to improve performance.

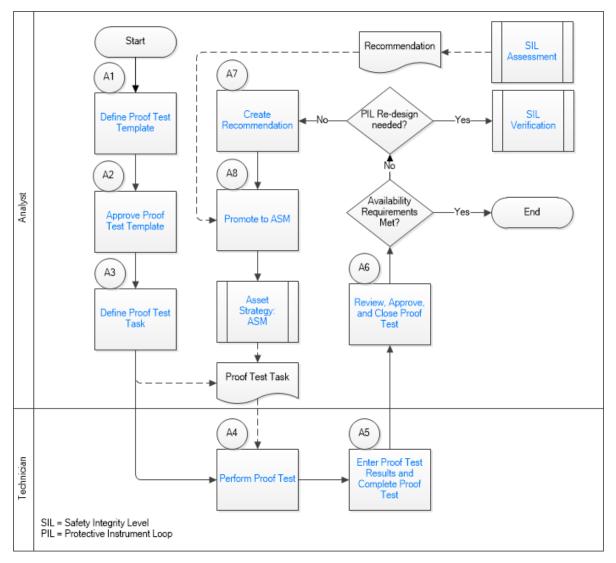

Define Proof Test Template

Persona: Analyst

Create a Proof Test Template and Proof Test Template Details to specify the trip points and error limits for each element in the PIL.

Approve Proof Test Template

Persona: Analyst

Approve the Proof Test Template by selecting Approved in the Template Status field.

Define Proof Test Task

Persona: Analyst

Create a Proof Test Task record to schedule the proof test and assign the task to a user. You can also use Inspection Tasks (of the type Proof Test) created in Asset Strategy Management, which are listed in the **Proof Test Tasks** section of the **SIS Management Overview** page.

Perform Proof Test

Persona: Technician

Print the Proof Test Template. Perform the proof test in the field as per the instructions provided in the Proof Test Template.

Enter Proof Test Results and Complete Proof Test

Persona: Technician

Create a Proof Test to enter the readings taken while performing the proof test in the field. Link the Proof Test to the Proof Test Template and the Proof Test Task. APM indicates whether each step in the proof test has passed or failed.

Review, Approve, and Close Proof Test

Persona: Analyst

Review the proof test results, and then close it by selecting Closed in the Functional Test Status field.

Create Recommendation

Persona: Analyst

You can create a Recommendation to provide suggestions to improve the proof test results or to prevent overt failures such as broken electrical conduit, failure of a protective element, rusted wires, or the presence of excess moisture.

Promote to ASM

Persona: Analyst

Promote the Recommendation to Asset Strategy Management (ASM), where the associated action can be implemented as an Inspection Task of the task type Proof Test.

Asset Strategy Management

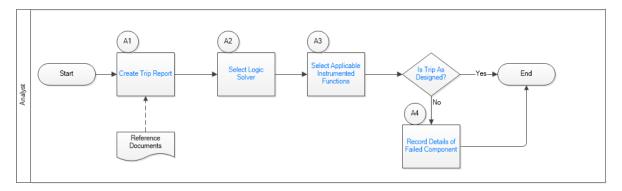

Create Trip Report

Persona: Analyst

Create a Trip Report record to store the details of the trip that occurred.

Select Logic Solver

Persona: Analyst

Select the Logic Solver that is associated with the Instrumented Functions for which the trip occurred.

Select Applicable Instrumented Functions

Persona: Analyst

Select the Instrumented Functions that are associated with the trip that occurred.

Is Trip As Designed?

Persona: Analyst

Determine whether the trip was as designed, spurious, or dangerous.

Record Details of Failed Component

Persona: Analyst

If the trip was not as designed (i.e., spurious or dangerous), then enter the details of the Protective Instrument Loop element that caused the trip. For example, if a trip was caused when a sensor indicated high pressure even when the pressure level was normal, enter the details of the sensor. For that example, the trip type would be Spurious.

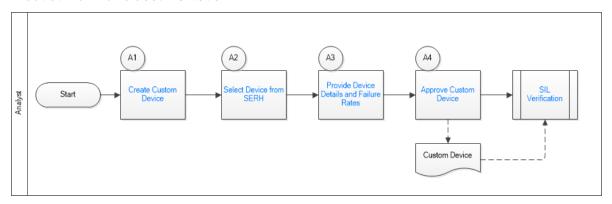

Create Custom Device

Create a Custom Device to store the details of the sensor, logic solver, or final element that you want to use.

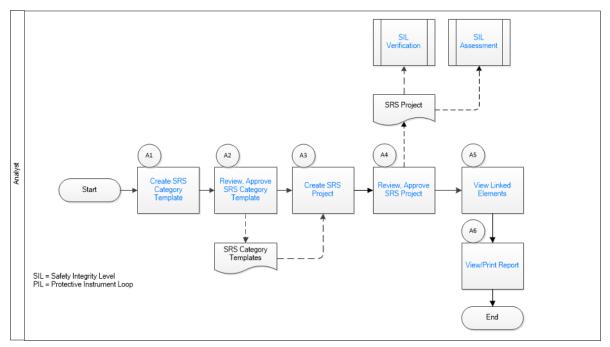

About Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Analysis

A Safety Integrity Level (SIL) analysis lets you assess the safety instrumented systems in your facility to ensure that they are adequately safeguarding your equipment, locations, and processes.

When you conduct an SIL analysis, you will:

- Assess the level of safety integrity per instrumented function, using the APM Risk Matrix interface or via a Layer of Protection Analysis (LOPA). Based on the defined risks, the APM system calculates the overall SIL for the safety instrumented system.
- Verify the SIL of the safety instrumented system using the SIL Verification feature, which
 lets you make up the safety instrumented system and calculate the ability of a protective
 instrument loop to meet the required SIL for that process. The APM system uses equations
 defined by International Electrotechnical Commission (IEC) to calculate the probability of
 failure on Demand average (PFD Avg) or probability of failure per hour (PFH).
- Determine whether further safeguarding is necessary, based on the SIL maintained by those safety instrumented systems.

About Revision History

The Revision History feature allows you to manage the revisions made for an entire analysis. When you create an SIL Analysis, you link records in multiple families to the SIL Analysis. When you complete an analysis (i.e., it has been approved), you will change the state of the SIL Analysis to Complete. When you do so, a snapshot is taken of the SIL Analysis and each record linked to it.

When the state of an SIL Analysis is changed to Complete, one record in each of the following families will be created:

- · SIL Analysis Revision
- Logic Solver Revision
- Instrumented Function Revision
- LOPA Revision
- PHA Internal Assessment Revision
- Risk Matrix Internal Assessment Revision
- · External Assessment Revision

Each Revision record stores a snapshot of the source record as it appeared when the state of the SIL Analysis was changed.

If you re-evaluate the SIL Analysis, the state of the SIL Analysis will change again to the Complete. A second set of Revision records will be created, and so on.

About the SIL Analysis Team

The Safety Integrity Level (SIL) analysis team is a group of members who will complete the SIL analysis. You can add APM users and non-APM users to the SIL analysis team.

• APM users will have an existing APM Security User and an associated Human Resource record that was created automatically when the Security User was created.

 Non-APM users will not have a APM Security User or a Human Resource record. To add a non-APM user to the SIL analysis team, you will need to create a Human Resource record for that user. You can do so via the SIL Analysis Team Members page or using APM Tools.

Note: A APM Security User record is required for logging in to the APM application and using SIS Management. SIL analysis team members who do not have a Security User account may participate in and contribute to the analysis but will not be able to use APM.

Team Member Roles

SIL analysis team member roles serve as a reference of which SIL analysis team member is responsible for a given task related to the SIL analysis. Any member of the SIL analysis team can be assigned a role within the SIL analysis team. The following roles are available for an SIL analysis:

- **Owner:** The team member who is responsible for assets represented in the SIL analysis. After you assign a team member the role of Owner, that team member's name will appear in the Owner field in the SIL Analysis.
- **Facilitator**: The team member who is in charge of conducting the analysis and organizing the team.

There can be only one Process Owner and one Facilitator per analysis.

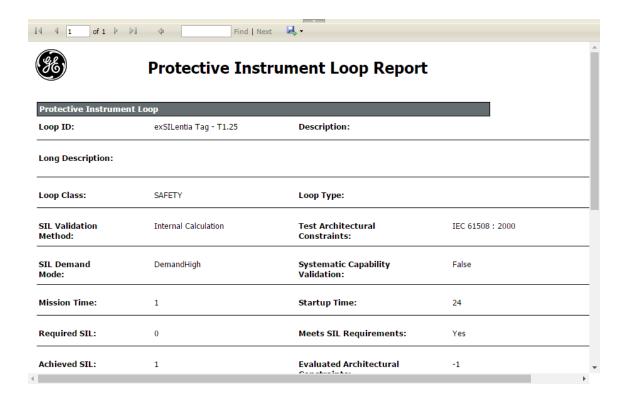

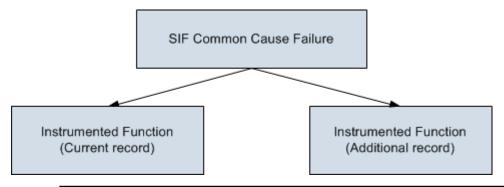
About Common Cause Failure

A common cause failure is a failure or condition within a plant that can affect the operation of multiple instrumented functions. SIF Common Cause Failures must be linked to at least two Instrumented Functions. In other words, for every SIF Common Cause Failure, there will be at least two Instrumented Function records that represent the instrumented functions that are affected by the common cause failure defined in the SIF Common Cause Failure record.

You can manage SIF Common Cause Failure records via the **Common Cause Failures** section of the Instrumented Function. Using the **Common Cause Failures** section, you can specify the common cause failures that exist for the current instrumented function and other instrumented functions that are defined in the APM database. More specifically, to define a common cause failure, you will need to:

- Link SIF Common Cause Failure records to the current Instrumented Function.
- Link additional Instrumented Function records to those SIF Common Cause Failure records.

The following illustration shows the records that will exist for a given common cause failure scenario.



Common Cause Failure

Incorrect maintenance of sensors can affect multiple instrumented functions. In this case, you would first create an SIF Common Cause Failure to document incorrect maintenance of sensors as a common cause failure, and then link that SIF Common Cause Failure to the Instrumented Function records that would be affected by the incorrect sensor maintenance.

About Concurrent Safe State Hazards

When you create an Instrumented Function, you will define the safe state of the instrumented function, which is responsible for modifying the process in the event that the condition of the process is in an unsafe state. In other words, if a given process is approaching an unsafe condition, the instrumented function that monitors that process will change the process to a condition that is specified as the safe state for that process.

In some cases, if a given process is in its associated safe state at the same time as a different Instrumented Function, while the individual processes are in a safe state, the combination of these conditions could trigger a hazardous event. For example, assume that to reach a safe state in a Flare system, the process valve needs to vent. Now assume that two process valves need to vent at the same time. In this case, the Flare system can become overloaded due to both processes reaching their safe states concurrently.

In APM, the combinations of safe states that can lead to hazardous events are referred to as concurrent safe state hazards. You can document the concurrent safe state hazards that exist for instrumented functions via the Instrumented Function record. In other words, for each instrumented function that participates in a potentially hazardous relationship, you will need to define the concurrent safe state hazard(s) for that instrumented function.

The **Concurrent Safe States** section of the Instrumented Function allows you to manage all the concurrent safe state hazards that exist for an instrumented function. To define concurrent safe state hazards for an instrumented function, you will need to:

- Link the Instrumented Function to the other Instrumented Function whose concurrent safe state can cause a hazard. Instrumented Functions can be linked to one or more other Instrumented Functions through the Has Hazardous Event relationship.
- Describe the hazardous event that can occur when the safe state conditions occur
 concurrently. Since some instrumented functions can participate in multiple concurrent
 safe state scenarios, in each Instrumented Function, you will need to describe the
 hazardous events that are associated with that instrumented function. In other words,
 describing the hazardous event in one Instrumented Function will not automatically
 populate the linked Instrumented Function with the same description. You will need to
 access the linked Instrumented Function and enter the description of the concurrent safe
 state hazard.

Create a Concurrent Safe States Record

Before You Begin

· Create an Instrumented Function.

Procedure

- Access the Instrumented Function to which you want to create a Concurrent Safe States record.
- 2. In the workspace, select the SIL Assessment tab, and then select Concurrent Safe States.

The **Concurrent Safe States** section appears, displaying a list of Concurrent Safe States for the Instrumented Function.

Note: If the fields in the **Concurrent Safe States** section do not appear on the datasheet, select the **Hazard for Concurrent Safe State** check box.

About Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Assessment

Before the Safety Integrity Level (SIL) analysis team can make recommendations for actions that should be taken to mitigate risk for a given safety instrumented system, the team must first assign a numeric rating to each instrumented function within that safety instrumented system. The SIL is a numeric value that represents an overall rating for the instrumented function. This rating tells you to what degree the instrumented function meets its requirements to mitigate risk. After you have assigned an SIL value to each instrumented function within a safety instrumented system, the combination of these values indicates the overall safety integrity of the safety instrumented system to which the instrumented functions belong.

SIL Assessment Methods

You can use the following methods to assess the SIL value for an instrumented system:

- Risk Matrix
- Layer of Protection Analysis (LOPA)
- · Hazards Analysis Risk Assessment

You can use more than one assessment method to determine the SIL value for an instrumented function. The list of SIL assessments performed on the instrumented function are listed in the **SIL Assessment** section of the Instrumented Function workspace. However, you can associate only one SIL Assessment with the Instrumented Function.

Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Assessment Workflow

This workflow provides the basic, high-level steps for performing a Safety Integrity Level (SIL) assessment. The steps and links in this workflow do not necessarily reference every possible procedure.

Performing an SIL assessment includes the following steps:

- Assess the required SIL value for an Instrumented Function by creating the following SIL Assessment records:
 - Layer of Protection Analysis (LOPA)
 - Risk Matrix
 - Process Hazards Analysis (PHA)
 - External

Note: You can create only one Risk Matrix and PHA SIL Assessment records for an Instrumented Function.

2. Associate the appropriate SIL Assessment with the Instrumented Function.

About Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Assessment Using a Risk Matrix

You can assess the Safety Integrity Level (SIL) of an instrumented function using the standard APM Risk Matrix interface to select the risk rank values for specific categories of risk.

To determine the SIL value using a Risk Matrix, you must:

- 1. Specify the SIL Threshold values. An SIL Threshold record stores the upper and lower boundary values for each SIL.
- 2. Select the risk assessment that you want to use to assess the SIL value. You can use the baseline Risk Matrix or a custom Risk Matrix.
- 3. Select the unmitigated risk rank values for each category in the Risk Matrix. APM then calculates the overall unmitigated risk rank by adding the unmitigated risk rank values for each category. This value is stored in the **Unmitigated Risk Rank** box above the Risk Matrix on the Risk Assessment Interface.

The category that has been assigned with the highest risk rank in the Risk Matrix is called the Driving Risk, and the corresponding risk rank is called the Driving Risk Rank. Depending on the range in which the driving risk rank value falls, the system determines the SIL, and then populates the Selected SIL Level field with this value.

About Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Assessment Using a Hazards Analysis

If you have already performed risk assessments for a Hazards Analysis via the Hazards Analysis module, you can use one of those risk assessments to assess the Safety Integrity Level (SIL) for an instrumented function.

To determine SIL using a PHA Internal assessment, you must:

- 1. Specify the SIL Threshold values. An SIL Threshold record stores the upper and lower boundary values for each SIL.
- 2. Select the Hazards Analysis and the Cause-Consequence pair that you want to use to assess the SIL value.

The category that has been assigned with the highest risk rank in the risk assessment is called the Driving Risk, and the corresponding risk rank is called the Driving Risk Rank.

The system determines which risk rank values to use based on the following criteria:

- If the risk from the Hazards Analysis has not been mitigated, the Driving Risk Rank of the unmitigated risk assessment is used to calculate SIL.
- If the risk from the Hazards Analysis has been mitigated, then the Driving Risk Rank of the mitigated risk assessment is used to calculate SIL.

Depending on the range in which the driving risk rank value falls, APM determines the SIL, and then populates the Selected SIL Level field with this value.

About SIL Assessment Using LOPA

A Layer of Protection Analysis (LOPA) is a type of risk assessment that lets you determine the SIL value that is associated with the protective instruments that exist to mitigate the same risks for which the instrumented function exists. When you use a LOPA to assess the SIL value for an instrumented function, you examine the granular portions of the scenario and assess the risk associated with each portion, and then those individual risk values are used to calculate the SIL value for the instrumented function.

You can conduct one LOPA per risk that is associated with an instrumented function. Refer to the LOPA documentation for further information on managing LOPA and related record.

To assess the SIL value for an Instrumented Function using LOPA, you must link the LOPA to the LOPA Assessment of the Instrumented Function.

LOPA

When you create a LOPA record, it will be linked to the corresponding Instrumented Function record.

LOPA records can be linked to records in the following families:

- Conditional Modifier: Stores details about the consequences of the risk described in the LOPA.
- Hazards Analysis Safeguard: Stores details about the safeguards and independent layers
 of protection that exist to mitigate the risk associated with the consequences described in
 the Conditional Modifiers. Independent Layers of Protection can be linked to Equipment
 and Functional Locations, which store details about the equipment or location with which
 the independent layers of protection are associated.

These families also store numeric values that represent probability and failure rates. These values are used to calculate the SIL value of the instrumented function whose risks you are assessing through the LOPA. The calculated SIL value is stored in the Calculated SIL field in the LOPA.

When you create a LOPA, you will define the following items in the record:

- The risk for which you are conducting the LOPA.
- The consequences that may occur if that risk is not prevented from proceeding into an undesirable scenario.
- The events or conditions that can initiate the undesirable event.
- How often the event may occur.
- How often it is acceptable for the event to occur.

Independent Layers of Protection

An independent layer of protection is a device, system, or action that exists to prevent a risk, and that is independent of the event that initiates the scenario. An independent layer of protection is external to any other layer of protection or safety instrumented system. The effectiveness of an independent layer of protection is quantified in terms of its probability of failure data (PFD), which is a numeric value that represents the probability that the independent layer of protection will fail to perform its specified function.

You can use the values in the **Type** list to populate an Independent Layer of Protection automatically with values from an IPL Type record. IPL Type records are provided in the baseline database, and can be defined by an SIS Administrator or SIS Engineer.

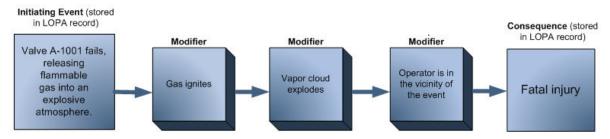
You should create one Safeguard record per layer of protection that exists. Via the Safeguard datasheet, you can link the Independent Layer of Protection to the Equipment or Functional Location for which the layer of protection exists.

Conditional Modifier

A conditional modifier is an action or event that can increase or decrease the probability that a risk may occur if the action is not mitigated and proceeds into an undesirable event. Details about a conditional modifier are stored in Conditional Modifier records, which are linked to LOPA records.

For example, assume that the SIL analysis team is conducting a LOPA to investigate the risk scenario illustrated in the following diagram, where each box represents a portion of the scenario, and each label indicates the family that stores the relevant information:

When Valve A-1001 fails, flammable gas is released into an explosive atmosphere. If the flame ignites, causing a vapor cloud explosion in the vicinity of the operator, it could cause a fatal injury.



In this risk scenario, the fatal injury is a consequence of the valve failure, and the following events or actions are the conditional modifiers:

- The flame igniting
- The vapor cloud exploding
- The operator being in the vicinity of the explosion

Since these actions and events appear within the risk scenario, the probability associated with the consequence occurring is increased exponentially. In other words, if the operator was not in the vicinity of the blast, the probability of fatal injury would be less. By examining the granular events that are associated with a risk, the SIL analysis team can more accurately assess the SIL value for the instrumented function.

Assess the Safety Integrity Level (SIL) via a Layer of Protection Analysis (LOPA)

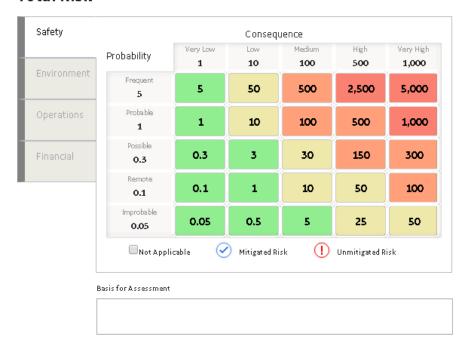

About Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Verification

After you assess the SIL level of an instrumented function, you must verify if the safety instrumented system meets the targeted SIL level. To facilitate this verification, the SIL Verification feature allows you to create a protective instrument loop, and then calculate the SIL level for the loop.

About Protective Instrument Loops

A protective instrument loop consists of interconnected instruments that work together to serve a function that is defined for the safety instrumented system within which they exist.

When you create a protective instrument loop in SIS Management, you are creating a Protective Instrument Loop record. When you define the elements of the protective instrument loop (i.e., the interconnected instruments), you are creating records in the Protective Instrument Loop Element family and its subfamilies, and linking them to the Protective Instrument Loop. Throughout this documentation, when we refer to the protective instrument loop, we are referring to the Protective Instrument Loop and all the records that are linked to it. When we refer to Protective Instrument Loop Elements, we are referring to the records that are linked to the Protective Instrument Loop.

Protective Instrument Loop Elements

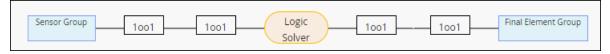
Each instrument in a protective instrument loop is called an element. The following protective instrument loop elements are defined in the APM system:

- · Logic Solver
- · Sensor System
- · Sensor Group
- Sensor
- Final Element System
- Final Element Group
- Final Element

By default, every protective instrument loop consists of at least one of each element. When you create a Protective Instrument Loop, the APM system creates one record for each of these elements, and links to the Protective Instrument Loop as shown in the data model.

Protective Instrument Loop Diagram

A protective instrument loop diagram is a visual representation of the number of each type of elements in the protective instrument loop. The following image shows the baseline protective instrument loop diagram.



To access or modify the datasheet of a protective instrument loop element, you must select the corresponding node in the diagram.

Important: If you have provided incorrect or insufficient information for a protective instrument loop element, then the APM system cannot calculate the loop results. This is

indicated by a \triangle icon that appears in the diagram for that element. You must then review the details of the element in the datasheet.

About Protective Instrument Loop Calculation Engine

APM supports the following calculation engines for the calculation of loop results in an SIL analysis:

- exSILentia v3
- exSILentia v4

The usage of exSILentia v4 calculation engine in APM provides improved accuracy in the calculated results. In addition, the following functionalities are provided:

- You can specify if redundant I/O channels must be on separate modules for an instrumented function.
- You can specify group level Mission Time for a Sensor Group, Logic Solver, and Final Element Group.

The ability to specify a Proof Test Scope for Final Elements is available. The exSILentia v4 calculation engine includes updates as per the latest revision of IEC 61511. The basis for Architectural Constraints only includes IEC 61511:2016 and IEC 61508:2010.

To enable a Protective Instrument Loop or Protective Instrument Loop Template to use the exSILentia v4 calculation engine, you must upgrade the loop.

Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Verification Workflow

This workflow provides the basic, high-level steps for performing a Safety Integrity Level (SIL) verification. The steps and links in this workflow do not necessarily reference every possible procedure.

Performing an SIL Verification includes the following steps:

- 1. Create a Protective Instrument Loop. After you create a Protective Instrument Loop, the APM system creates one record for each of its elements.
- 2. Provide the details of the following elements of the loop in the corresponding records:
 - Sensor System
 - Sensor Group
 - Sensor
 - · Logic Solver
 - Final Element System
 - Final Element Group
 - Final Element
- 3. If there are additional elements in the loop apart from the default ones, create records for them. The APM system builds the diagram based on the elements that you have added.
- 4. Compare the calculated results of the loop to verify if the Safety Integrity Level (SIL) target is achieved.

About Asset Groups in SIS Management

When you create an Instrumented Function in SIS Management, you can associate it with a piece of Equipment and a Functional Location. The piece of Equipment and the Functional Location together form an Asset. The Asset that is associated with the Instrumented Function is the asset that you are protecting.

Similarly, when you create a Protective Instrument Loop, you can associate each element in the loop with a piece of Equipment and a Functional Location. The Assets that are associated with the individual Protective Instrument Loops are the ones that are required to protect the Asset associated with the Instrumented Function.

The APM system creates an asset group for each Protective Instrument Loop. This group contains all the Equipment and Functional Locations associated with each sensor, logic solver, and final element in the loop. This group is named in the following format: <The ID of the SIL Analysis ID>/<ID of the Instrumented Function>/<ID of the Protective Instrument Loop> Asset Group. The APM system updates this group when you add a new element to the loop, remove an element from the loop, or associate an existing element with a new Equipment or Functional Location.

You can search for these groups on the **Assets** page.

About Validation Failure Rate Reference Data

Failure rate reference data refers to data that exists to record trends in failure rates for categories of elements that exist in a protective instrument loop. These elements can be categorized by application, technology, size, or any other technical characteristic.

Before you add an element to a protective instrument loop, you can consider the failure rate reference data that is associated with that element type, and then make a decision on whether or not to use that particular element.

Validation failure rate reference data is available for the following records:

- Sensor
- Logic Solver
- Final Element

The Is Reference Data check box in these records is set to True.

Note: By default, the **Is Reference Data** check box is not included on the datasheet. This field is used by the APM system, and is not meant to be modified manually.

When you create a Protective Instrument Loop Element via the Validation Failure Rate Reference Data feature, the APM system will automatically select the **Is Reference Data** check box in that record.

About Approving a Device for Use

You can use the Validation Failure Rate Reference Data feature to determine which elements are approved for use with a protective instrument loop. After you have determined that a given element is approved, you can select the **Approve** button in the upper-right corner of the datasheet. When you do so, the APM system will automatically select the **Approved Custom Device** check box in that record, and it will be available for selection in the SIL Verification feature.

If you later determine that an element is no longer approved for use in a protective instrument loop, you can revoke that approval in the record.

Note: To approve a Protective Instrument Loop Element, you must be a member of the SIS Administrator or SIS Engineer Security Group.

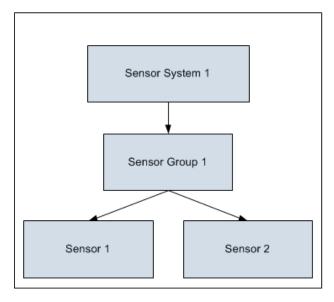
About Copying a Protective Instrument Loop Element

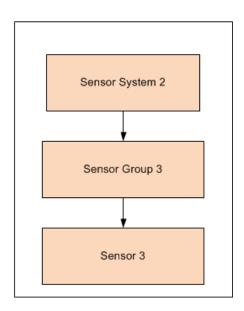
When you copy a Protective Instrument Loop Element:

- The values in each field of the copied record are overwritten by those of the original record that you copy.
- The value in the Element ID field in the copied record is appended with 1.
- All the child records linked to the original record also become a part of the record that you copy, replacing the existing ones.

For example, consider two protective instrument loops, Loop 1 and Loop 2, with the following sensor systems, sensor groups, and sensors:

Loop 1 Loop 2



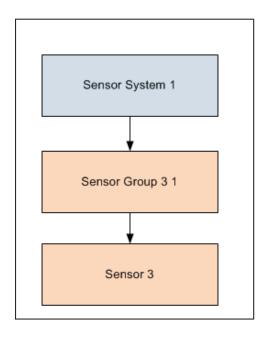


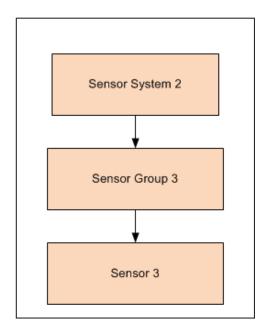
Suppose you copy Sensor Group 3 into Sensor Group 1:

- The values for all the fields in Sensor Group 1 are overwritten by those in Sensor Group 3.
- The ID for Sensor Group 1 becomes Sensor Group 3 1.
- Sensor 1 and Sensor 2 are replaced by Sensor 3. If Sensor 1 and Sensor 2 are not part of another protective instrument loop, they are deleted. Otherwise, they are unlinked from Loop 1.

The following image illustrates the changes in Loop 1 after you copy Sensor Group 3:

About Dangerous Combination of Outputs

When you define a Protective Instrument Loop Final Element, you must define the potential hazards that can occur if the output state associated with the final element is combined with the output state associated with another final element. While the output state associated with individual final elements is safe, in some cases, when output states associated with multiple final elements are combined, a hazardous event can occur. For example, if the output state associated with Final Element A has the potential to fill a tank half full, and the output state associated with Final Element B has the potential to fill the same tank half full, these combined output states have the potential to overflow the tank. In this way, Final Element A and Final Element B have a combined output state hazard.

You can document combined output state hazards that exist for final elements in the **Dangerous Combination of Outputs** section in the Protective Instrument Loop Final Element. In other words, for each final element that participates in a potentially hazardous relationship, you will need to define the combined output state hazard(s) for that final element.

Steps in Defining Dangerous Combination of Outputs

To define combined output state hazards for a final element, you must:

- Link the Protective Instrument Loop Final Element to the other Protective Instrument Loop Final Element representing the final element whose output state can cause a hazard when combined with the output state of the current final element. Protective Instrument Loop Final Elements can be linked to one or more other Protective Instrument Loop Final Elements through the Has Hazardous Event relationship.
- Describe the hazardous event that can occur when the output states are combined. Since some final elements can participate in multiple combined output state hazard scenarios, in each Protective Instrument Loop Final Element, you will need to describe the hazardous events that are associated with that final element. In other words, describing the

hazardous event in one Protective Instrument Loop Final Element will not populate the linked Protective Instrument Loop Final Element with the same description.

About Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Validation

Safety instrumented systems and each instrumented function within that system must be tested to ensure that those systems is functioning to the standards for which they are designed. A proof test consists of a set of steps that you need to perform to test safety instrumented systems and instrumented functions. The conditions under which the test is conducted should represent the normal conditions under which the system is intended to operate.

Depending on the group of equipment or devices that make up a safety instrumented system, you will want to define a set of test steps that apply to a given group of equipment or devices. In other words, you will need to define one set of test steps that you can reuse when you test similar systems.

Creating Records in Proof Testing

For each proof test that you want to conduct, you should create at least one record in each of the following families:

- **SIS Proof Test Template**: Stores details about a given proof test, including the steps that need to be performed. For each unique set of test steps that exists, you will need to create one SIS Proof Test Template to store those details.
- SIS Proof Test Template Detail: Stores the details on each specific step that needs to be performed for the test. These records are linked to SIS Proof Test Templates through the Has Template Detail relationship. You should create one SIS Proof Test Template Detail for each step that is required for that test.
- Inspection Task: Stores the details of the proof test task, which specifies the schedule for the proof test. These records are linked to the asset on which you will perform the proof test and to the Proof Test through the Has Task relationship. After you perform the proof test and the Proof Test that is linked to the asset is closed, the Proof Test Task is updated automatically to reflect the date on which the proof test was performed and the next date on which the proof test is due for that asset. Proof Tests Tasks are also created in Asset Strategy Management (ASM) after you promote a Recommendation to ASM.
- SIS Proof Test: Stores details about a proof test that you perform, including the test results. When you create an SIS Proof Test, you will need to specify the SIS Proof Test Template that contains the details about the proof test you want to perform. When you select the SIS Proof Test Template, one Functional Test Detail will be created for each SIS Proof Test Template Detail that is linked to the SIS Proof Test Template. For each proof test that you want to perform, you will need to create one SIS Proof Test. You can, however, reuse SIS Proof Test Templates.

You can think of the SIS Proof Test Template and SIS Proof Test Template Details as the specifications for how the test should be performed, and the SIS Proof Test and Functional Test Details as a record of the test occurring.

Steps Involved in Conducting a Proof Test

To conduct a proof test, you will need to complete the following steps:

 Define the proof test steps that need to be performed for a given safety instrumented system by creating one Proof Test Template for each type of test that will need to be performed. Creating an SIS Proof Test Template includes linking SIS Proof Test Template Details to the SIS Proof Test Template. 2. **Create one SIS Proof Test**, which serves as a record of the test event and stores the results of that test.

This topic provides details on SIS Proof Test Template and SIS Proof Tests. For details on how these families participate in the SIS Management data model, see the SIS Management data model.

About Mobile Proof Tests

You can use Mobile Proof Testing on the APM mobile application to run test procedures and collect proof testing data using mobile devices, such as a tablet. You can record values for the Proof Test and create recommendations (e.g., a maintenance follow-up) for the proof test, directly from the mobile device even if the mobile device is disconnected from the network.

When you download a Proof Test Task for offline access, on the **Mobile Proof Testing** page,

the icon appears on the downloaded Proof Test Task, indicating that the Proof Test Task is downloaded to the mobile device that you will use for recording values for the Proof Test.

About Synchronizing Mobile Proof Tests

When you reconnect the mobile device to the network, the values that you recorded in the Proof Tests and the Recommendations that you created are uploaded automatically to the APM database.

The color of the color of the Proof Test in the

Mobile Proof Testing page, indicates the status of synchronization. The icon changes to one of the following:

- Indicates that the synchronization is completed successfully. The values that you recorded in the Proof Test and the associated Recommendations are uploaded to the database.
- Indicates that the synchronization failed. When you select , a message appears, describing the error that has caused the synchronization to fail. The error may be either in the Proof Test or in the Recommendation.

On successful synchronization, APM copies the values in the Proof Tests that you executed in the mobile device to the corresponding Proof Tests in the database. You can access these Proof Tests from the SIS Management module.

APM system creates copies of the Recommendations that you created in the mobile device, and then links them to the Instrumented Functions with which the Proof Test Tasks are associated. The images attached to the Recommendations that you created for the Proof Test appear as Reference Documents in the Recommendations created for the Instrumented Function.

Tip: For more information, refer to the Manage Reference Documents section of the Record Manager module for additional options when working with reference documents.

Safety Integrity Level (SIL) Validation Workflow

This workflow provides the basic, high-level steps for performing an SIL validation. The steps and links in this workflow do not necessarily reference every possible procedure.

Performing an SIL Verification includes the following steps:

- Create a Proof Test Template, which stores the details of the pass/fail criteria and error limits
- 2. Create a Proof Test Task, which stores the schedule for the task.
- 3. Perform the proof test.
- 4. Create a Proof Test.
- 5. Apply the Proof Test Template and the Proof Test Task to the Proof Test.
- 6. In the Proof Test record, provide the results of the proof test that you have performed.
- 7. The APM system performs the error calculations and provides the pass/fail results.

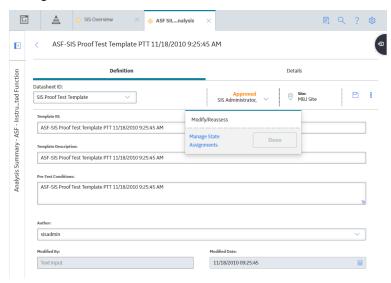

About SIS Trip Report

SIS Trip Reports are records that store details on events, which occurred on a safety instrumented system, such as a trip alarm. For example, if during a process, the gas pressure level increased to an unmanageable level and the safety instrumented system turned off the gas feed, you would create one SIS Trip Report to record the details of that trip alarm event.

When you create an SIS Trip Report, you will link it to a Logic Solver. When you create an SIS Trip Report Detail, you will select an Instrumented Function from among the ones that are linked to the Logic Solver. APM creates an SIS Trip Report Detail for each Instrumented Function that you have selected.

SIS Trip Report Details store details of the Instrumented Function with which it is associated. They also contain the decision that is made around the particular trip event, which is stored in the Action box. For example, you can specify a trip event as Dangerous or Safe.

Access an SIS Trip Report

About SRS Templates

The IEC61511 standard is a performance-based standard that is all about the performance of the SIS and reducing risk, and defines what the SRS should contain all the requirements for the Safety Instrumented System and its associated Safety Instrumented Functions (SIFs).

The SIS consists of one or more Safety Instrumented Functions (SIFs), which can consist of a combination of sensor(s), logic solver(s) and final element(s), including all interfaces and sources of power. Therefore, the SRS needs to define a number of criteria for each SIF: a set of Functional Requirements and a set of Integrity Requirements (Safety Integrity Level target), indicating the amount of risk reduction required to be achieved (i.e. a measure of its dependability), as well as failure modes, operations and maintenance related information. The SRS templates account for these functional and integrity requirements.

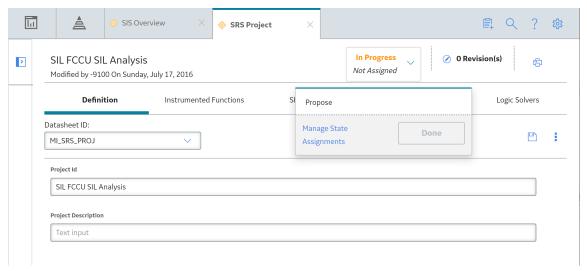

About Administration Settings to Define Required Categories

A user can use the SRS Project administration settings to create a custom selection of required categories when an SRS Project is created. New SRS Projects will automatically contain all default SRS Categories.

Create an SRS Category

You can create an SRS Category only if you are a Super User or a user with administrative privileges.

Procedure

1. In the **Applications** menu, navigate to the **ADMIN** section, and then select **Configuration Manager**.

The Configuration Manager page appears.

2. On the Configuration Manager page, select Family Management.

The **Family Management** page appears, displaying the list of already existing families. The **Home** family is selected by default. In the left pane, below the **Home** tab, all of the families in the hierarchy appear in alphabetical order. Note that you cannot change the order of the

families. You can expand a family hierarchy by selecting the button in the tab for that family.

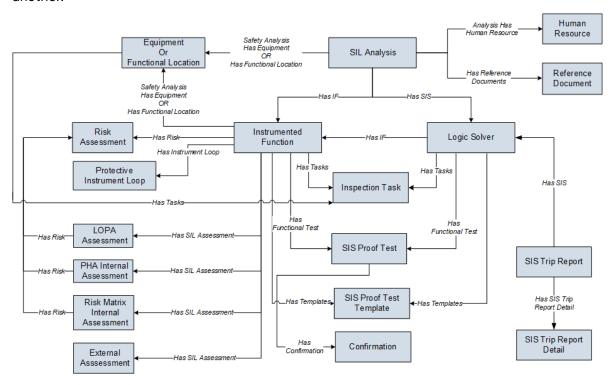

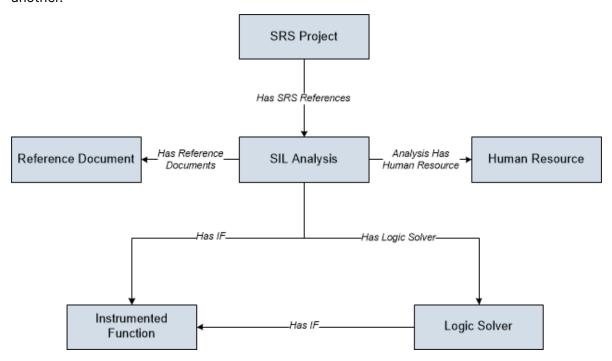

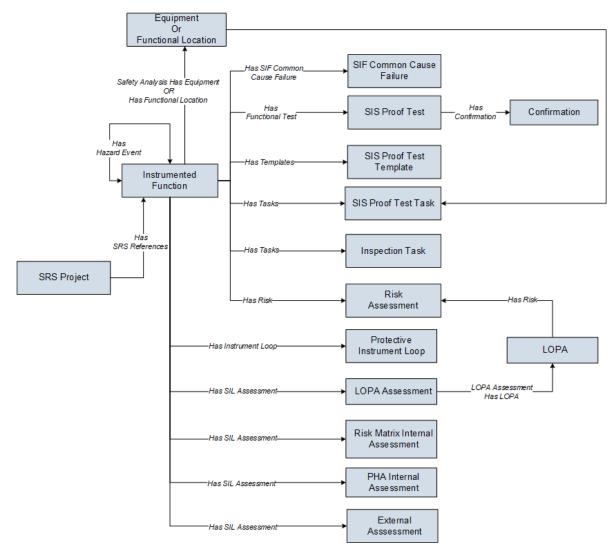

- **Instrumented Function**: Stores information about the instrumented functions of the safety instrumented system that you are analyzing.
- **Logic Solver**: Stores information about the safety instrumented systems that you are analyzing.

Additionally, Logic Solver) records and Instrumented Function) records are linked to one another through the Has IF relationship. In addition to the relationships described above, an SIL analysis includes records in the families that are linked to the Logic Solvers and Instrumented Functions.

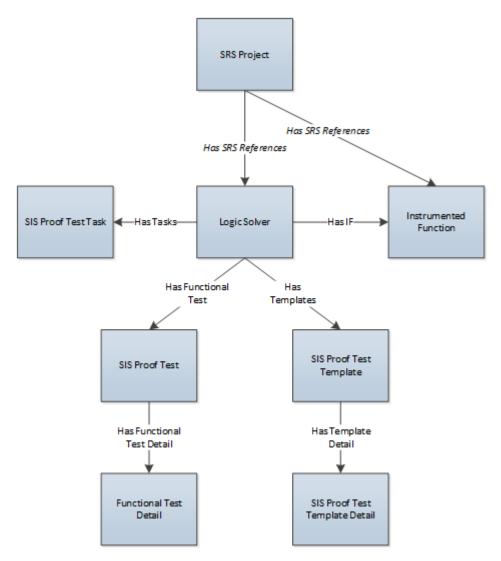

Instrumented Function records are linked directly to records in the following families:

- **Inspection Task**: Stores details on when a proof test should be performed on the Equipment that is linked to the Inspection Task, including the due date for the task.
- **SIS Proof Test**: Stores details about a test that is performed on a logic solver or an instrumented function and serves as a record of the event.
- SIS Proof Test Template: Stores details about the steps that should be taken when testing an instrumented function. When you create an SIS Proof Test, you must select an SIS Proof Test Template, and the details from the SIS Proof Test Template will be populated in the SIS Proof Test.
- SIS Proof Test Task: Stores details of proof test tasks that are scheduled for logic solvers or instrumented functions. SIS Proof Test Tasks can be linked to SIS Proof Tests.
- **Risk Assessment**: Stores the unmitigated risk associated with the item represented by the record to which the Risk Assessment record is linked.
- **Protective Instrument Loop**: Stores the details of the protective instrument loop and its components, including the calculated results of the proof test associated with the Logic Solver that is linked to the Protective Instrument Loop.
- LOPA Assessment: Stores the details of the Layer of Protection Analysis (LOPA) that conducted, including a description of the initiating event that is indicative of a process failure. The LOPA stores details of the risk assessment that is determined after conducting the Layer of Protection Analysis. The LOPA Assessment is linked to a LOPA record and the LOPA records are linked to Risk Assessment record.
- **PHA Internal Assessment**: Stores the details of the Process Hazards Analysis (PHA) assessment that you want to conduct, including the target Safety Integrity Level (SIL), Required Probability of Failure, Risk Reduction Factor, and the SIL Mode. These values are calculated based on the overall risk rank of the selected Hazards Analysis Consequence.
- **Risk Matrix Internal Assessment**: Stores the details of the risk matrix assessment that you want to conduct, including the target Safety Integrity Level (SIL), Required Probability of Failure, Risk Reduction Factor, and the SIL Mode. These values are calculated based on the risk rank that you specify using the risk matrix.
- **External Assessment**: Stores the details of the external assessment that you want to conduct, including the target SIL, Required Probability of Failure, Risk Reduction Factor, and the SIL Mode.
- **SIF Common Cause Failure**: Stores the details of a failure that affects the operation of multiple instrumented functions.
- **Instrumented Function**: Indicates that if both the instrumented functions represented by the two records are in their safe states at the same time, a hazardous event may occur.

Logic Solver Data Model

The following diagram shows how the families used to create a Logic Solver are related to one another.



In the diagram, the relationships between the Instrumented Function family and the SIS Proof Test, SIS Proof Test Task, and SIS Proof Test Template families are not included.

Note: In the diagram, boxes represent entity families and arrows represent relationship families that are configured in the baseline database. You can determine the direction of the each relationship definition from the direction of the arrow head: the box from which the arrow originates is the predecessor, and the box to which the arrow head points is the successor.

As shown in the image, Logic Solvers are linked to Instrumented Functions, which store information about the specific functions associated with the Logic Solver. Logic Solvers are also linked to records in the following families:

- **SIS Proof Test**: Stores details of proof tests that are performed on logic solvers or instrumented functions. SIS Proof Tests can be linked to Functional Test Details, which store the detailed steps that need to be performed during proof tests.
- SIS Proof Test Task: Stores details of proof test tasks that are scheduled for logic solvers or instrumented functions. SIS Proof Test Tasks can be linked to SIS Proof Tests.
- **SIS Proof Test Template**: Stores details of the steps that should be taken when testing a logic solver or an instrumented function. When you create an SIS Proof Test, you can

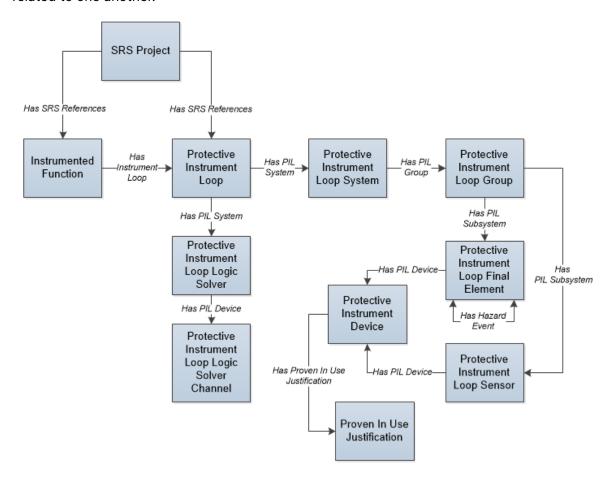

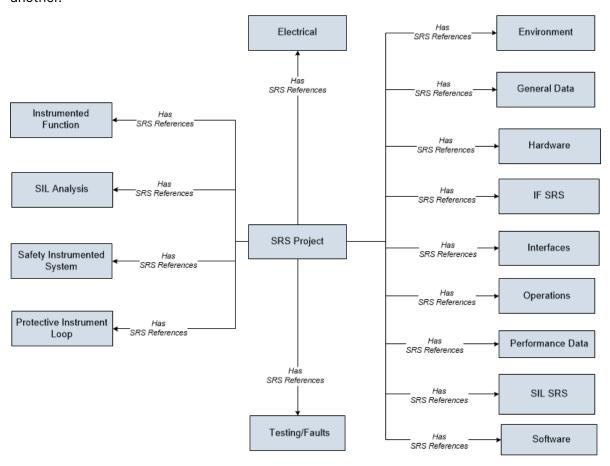

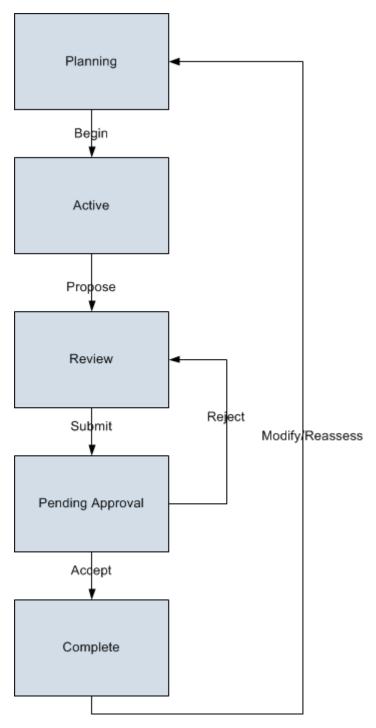

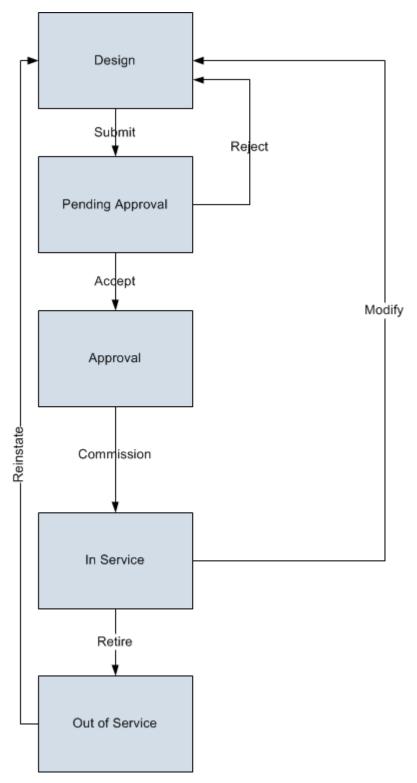

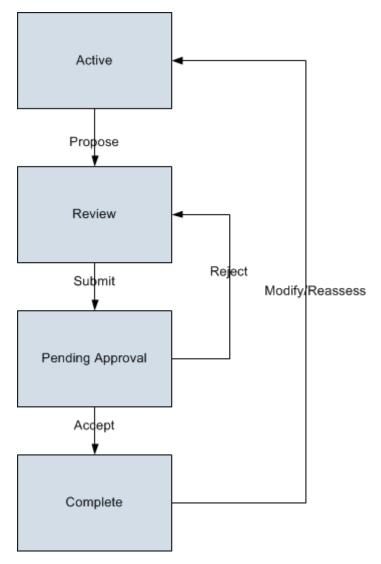

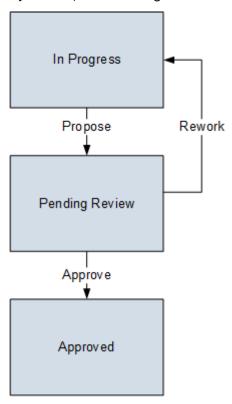

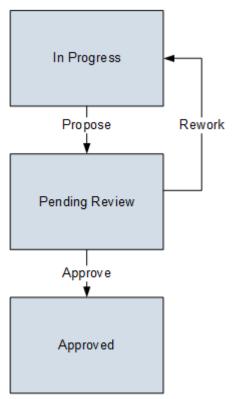

Scenario 1: User assigned to only Site X

This user will see SIL Analysis A and SIL Analysis D.

Scenario 3: Super User

This user will see SIL Analysis A, B, C and D.

Important: If a multi-site user, or a Super User, links child records from multiple sites to a parent record designated as **Global**, another user who does not have access to all sites may only see a portion of the data associated with that record. In the example above, if a child record assigned to Site X and a child record assigned to Site Y are linked to SIL Analysis D, the Site X user will not be able to see all the records associated with SIL Analysis D.

Calculations

About the Required Probability of Failure

The required probability of failure is a number representing the probability that an instrumented function will fail in a dangerous scenario. This value is represented as a probability value (e.g., .001), and is an indicator of whether the instrumented function is meeting its requirements to mitigate risk. The required probability of failure value is based on the following values stored in the Instrumented Function:

- The SIL value, which is stored in the Selected SIL Level field. The higher the SIL value for an instrumented function, the lower the probability that the instrumented function will fail.
- The method used to determine the SIL value, which is stored in the SIL Assessment Method field (e.g., Risk Matrix).
- The demand rate, which is stored in the SIL Mode field and represents the estimated probability that a dangerous condition will exist where the instrumented function is required to take the process to its safe state. For instance, if the demand rate is more than once a year, the hazard rate must not be higher than the failure rate. In this case, the SIL mode is high demand or continuous.

The following sections describe how the required probability of failure is calculated based on the SIL value, assessment method, and demand rate.

SIL Mode: Low Demand

In an Instrumented Function, when the value in the SIL Mode field is Low Demand, the APM system assumes that the demand rate of the instrumented function is less frequent than once per year. In these cases, the failure rate is measured by the average probability of failure on demand (PFD Avg).

SIL Value	Required Probability of Failure (PFD Avg)
4	$\geq 10^{-5}$ to $< 10^{-4}$
3	$\geq 10^{-4} \text{ to } < 10^{-3}$
2	$\geq 10^{-3}$ to $< 10^{-2}$
1	$\geq 10^{-2} \text{ to } < 10^{-1}$

SIL Mode: High Demand or Continuous

In an Instrumented Function, when the value in the SIL Mode field is High Demand or Continuous, the APM system assumes that the demand rate of the instrumented function is more frequent than once per year. In this case, the failure rate is measured by the average probability of dangerous failures per hour (PFH). The required probability of failure is defined by an industry standard that is associated with the SIL.

The required probability of failure is defined by the industry standard that is associated with each SIL. The following table contains the standard PFD Avg values for each SIL. The following table contains the standard PFH values for each SIL.

SIL Value	Required Probability of Failure (PFH)
4	$\geq 10^{-9} \text{ to } < 10^{-8}$
3	$\geq 10^{-8}$ to $< 10^{-7}$
2	$\geq 10^{-7} \text{ to } < 10^{-6}$
1	$\geq 10^{-6} \text{ to } < 10^{-5}$

SIL Assessment Method: Internal

If you use a Risk Matrix (internal) in SIL assessment, the value in the Required Probability of Failure field is disabled and populated with the lowest (i.e., the most conservative) value as the targeted probability. For example, if the SIL value is 2, the Required Probability of Failure field will be populated automatically with 1E-07 (i.e., 10⁻⁷) in case of a Low Demand SIL mode.

If you use an Layer of Protection Analysis (internal) in SIL assessment, the value in the Required Probability of Failure field is disabled and populated with the difference between the values in the Mitigated Consequence Frequency field and the Required Mitigated Consequence Frequency field in the LOPA.

SIL Assessment Method: External

If you use any external SIL Assessment method, the Required Probability of Failure field will be enabled, and you can enter the probability value manually. In this case:

- If you modify the value in the Selected SIL Level field, the value in the Required Probability
 of Failure field will be updated automatically to fall within the correct range of values for
 that level.
- If you type a value that does not fall within the range defined in the table, an error message will appear.
- If you type a value in the Required Probability of Failure field without first typing a value in the Selected SIL Level field, an error message will appear.

Risk Reduction Factor

Risk reduction factor can also be used to indicate the probability of failure for an instrumented function when the SIL mode is low demand. The risk reduction factor is the inverse of the required probability of failure, which is represented in years. For example, a required probability of failure value of .001 would equal a risk reduction factor of 1,000, meaning that the instrumented function would fail during a dangerous scenario about once every 1,000 years.

Calculating Risk Reduction Factor

The required probability of failure is defined by the industry standard that is associated with each SIL. The following table contains the standard PFD Avg values for each SIL.

If you modify the value in the Risk Reduction Factor field, the Required Probability of Failure field is populated with the inverse of the value in the Risk Reduction Factor field.
